Ways to Love the Difficult People in Church

Concluding part of *Cindi McMenami's* article Difficult people, we know, are everywhere—So, here is the last of the seven ways to love the difficult people and bring glory to God, joy to your heart, and more unity in the local community and church fellowship:

Tag-team the difficult person with a friend or mentor.

It's difficult to try to break another person's icy exterior or a difficult personality on your own. So, tag-team the difficult person with a friend at church who can help you show kindness to them.

Do you have a Christian friend or mentor in your life whom you can count on to say the right thing when that difficult person spouts off careless words, gossips about you, or rejects your attempts at kindness?

We all need positive, encouraging Christians in our lives to balance out the challenging ones.

Meet regularly with a mature believer who can help you stay grounded spiritually, pray with you for the difficult people in your church, and cultivate a heart and life that is pleasing to the Lord (Titus 2:3-5).

Meeting regularly with someone wise can help you step back from hurt, expectations, and overall "difficult people drama," and align your heart and thoughts with God's so you can not only know how to handle a difficult person, but also make sure YOU are not being one, as well.

When your mentor or friend can join you in your efforts to be kind and loving to the difficult people in your church, you then have a team project and not an individual effort. Ecclesiastes 4:9 tells us "Two are better than one because they have a good return for their labour" and tag-teaming a difficult person with love might be a perfect example of that.



DON'T PANIC!

Bible Reading: II Thess 2:1-12

At first glance, we might smile as we think about the words uttered regularly by Corporal Jones in "Dad's Army". These verses from Paul's letter to the Thessalonians may seem confusing. Paul's purpose however, is to remind the Thessalonians that, despite the doom and gloom happening all around, the Lord Jesus Christ will prevail and his people be vindicated.



Paul encourages them to persevere and not be thrown off-balance by teaching which allegedly came from him but actually did not (vs 1,2) and tells them not to be afraid because 'the day of the Lord' has not yet come (vs 2,3)

Then he refers to what will happen when 'the man of lawlessness' comes (vs 3-10).

First will be a great rebellion against God ^(v 4). The 'man of lawlessness' ^(v 3) can also be called both anti-Christ and anti-Law. Paul does not explain who this person is, only that he is to come and will be a rebel in league with Satan. [Look at verses 9 and 10.]

How does Paul describe 'the man of lawlessness' and what he will do? Despite all the uncertainties around Paul's meaning, the one thing beyond doubt is that Jesus will defeat this man (v 8)


Verses 1 and 2 remind the Thessalonians, and ourselves, that those who believe the lies of 'the man of lawlessness', live in the dark and take pleasure in wicked deeds will also be defeated by Jesus.

As we make our preparations for the Christmas Season, let us first remember that Jesus is light and defeats the darkness once and for all. Secondly, we must ask him to help us to hold on to that. Thirdly, we must Pray for people who are struggling with darkness at this time. **Author:** Ali Walton (Adapted)



Four Candles

Four candles were burning on the Advent wreath. Everything was so quiet and still that the candles started talking.

The first candle sighed: 'My name is PEACE. My flame is lit but mankind doesn't recognise the value of peace. It seems they just can't – or perhaps won't.'

And the candle's light got smaller and weaker, then finally went out.

The second candle trembled: 'My name is FAITH, but I feel as if I'm not needed. People don't believe anything any more, unless they can physically touch it and hold it in both hands.'

A breeze of air went through the room and the flickering candle died.

Quietly and timidly, the third candle spoke up: 'My name is LOVE. I no longer have the strength to keep burning. People have become so selfish and uncaring. They only think about what's best for them!'

And with one last flicker, its light also went out.

At that moment, a small boy came into the room. Seeing the candles, he looked puzzled as he said, 'You should be burning! You should all be alight. We need you!'

Then, the fourth candle spoke. 'Don't be afraid. As long as I'm on fire, I will always be able to give the other candles light and life! My name is HOPE.'

And with a small piece of wood, the boy took the light from the candle of hope, and used it to bring peace, faith and love to life again.



The Story of "Silent Night"

"Silent Night" is about a calm and bright silent night, and the wonder of a tender and mild newborn child, words written in 1816 by a young priest in Austria, Joseph Mohr, not long after the Napoleonic wars had taken their toll.

It was Christmas Eve, 1818, when the now-famous carol was first performed as *Stille Nacht Heilige Nacht*.

Joseph Mohr, the young priest who wrote the lyrics, played the guitar and sang along with Franz Xaver Gruber, the choir director who had written the melody.

An organ builder and repair man working at the church took a copy of the six-verse song to his home village. There, it was picked up and spread by two families of traveling folk singers, who performed around northern Europe. In 1834, the Strasser family performed it for the King of Prussia. In 1839, the Rainer family of singers debuted the carol outside Trinity Church in New York City.

The composition was translated into over 300 languages with many arrangements for various voices and ensembles.

It was sung in churches, in town squares, even on the battlefield during World War I, when, during a temporary truce on Christmas Eve, soldiers sang carols from home. "Silent Night," by 1914, known around the world, was sung simultaneously in French, German and English.

Over the years, the carol's mystique grew with its popularity.

After the original manuscript was lost, for decades, some speculated that the music had been written by Haydn, Mozart or Beethoven. In 1994, an original manuscript was found in Mohr's handwriting, with Gruber named as composer.

Today, the Franz Xaver Gruber Museum in Hallein and the Joseph Mohr School in Wagrain, Austria honour the creators of this classic carol.

The Stille Nacht Gesellschaft—or Silent Night Society—hosts a virtual Silent Night museum, tracks events, and promotes the use of all six verses, which in the words of Silent Night Society president "[encourage] peace and [demand] responsibility for the globe."

The English version of "Silent Night" is typically sung in three verses (corresponding with the original 1, 6, and 2.)

Silent night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright. 'Round yon Virgin Mother and Child, Holy Infant so tender and mild.
Sleep in heavenly peace, Sleep in heavenly peace.

Silent night, holy night! Shepherds quake at the sight! Glories stream from heaven afar, heavenly hosts sing Alleluia! Christ, the Saviour is born, Christ, the Saviour is born.

Silent night, holy night, Son of God, love's pure light. Radiant beams from thy holy face, with the dawn of redeeming grace. Jesus, Lord, at Thy birth, Jesus, Lord, at Thy birth.
